

Land Claims and Self-Government Household Survey 2021 Report

Prepared by Yukon Bureau of Statistics for Executive Council Office Government of Yukon



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Background

In 2011, the Yukon Bureau of Statistics conducted the 2011 Land Claims and Self Government Household Survey on behalf of the Yukon First Nations, the Yukon Government and the Council of Yukon First Nations (CYFN). The survey questionnaire was created by the Yukon Bureau of Statistics (YBS), with extensive support and input from the Implementation Working Group, which is comprised of representatives from Canada, Yukon, CYFN, and Yukon First Nations. The purpose of this survey was to assess the knowledge, understanding, and opinions of Yukon residents regarding land claims and self-government.

With a few minor updates to the questionnaire, the Land Claims and Self Government Household Survey was repeated in early 2021. This report summarizes the results of that follow-up survey.

Due to a change in the survey methodology including sampling design and sample frame, the results of the 2021 survey are not directly comparable to those of the previous survey in 2011. Therefore, any comparisons between the two surveys should be made with caution.

Methodology

YBS drew one adult at random from each household in a randomly drawn sample of all Yukon households in its household survey frame. The sample was stratified by geography (Whitehorse and rural communities), age group and gender. From a total sample of 1,198 households, 1,034 eligible respondents were identified. Those with invalid or incorrect contact information who could not be traced were removed from the sample.

Whenever there was an email address on file, respondents were invited by email to complete the survey online. After an initial email invitation and two weekly reminders, telephone interviews were conducted with those who did not respond to the email invitation and those for whom YBS had no email address on file.

Analytical weights were applied to the responses to generate population-level estimates after adjusting for non-responses by stratum. The weighted response rate for the survey was 59.1%, while the refusal rate was 11.8%.

Survey Results

The questionnaire included four main blocks of questions:

- A land claims knowledge self-assessment question and ten true-or-false questions to measure respondents' understanding of land claims and self-government in Yukon;
- Seven opinion questions about land claims and self-government;
- Relevance of land claims and self-government to respondents' work and personal lives;
- Reach and impact of the Mapping the Way public education campaign.


The questionnaire also included some demographic questions to collect information which was not available from the household survey frame, such as type of employer, indigenous identity, and indigenous family members. This information allowed the results to be cross-tabulated with a higher level of detail than would otherwise have been possible.

A. People's understanding of land claims and self-government

We used two approaches to measure people's understanding of land claims and self-government. The first approach was to ask the respondents how knowledgeable they feel about the subject. The second approach was to use a series of ten true or false questions to test the respondents' knowledge of facts about land claims and self-government in Yukon.

In Question 1, we asked the respondents how knowledgeable they feel about land claims and self-government in the Yukon, in general. The options included 'very knowledgeable,' 'somewhat knowledgeable,' 'not very knowledgeable,' and 'not knowledgeable at all.'

Overall, 49.7% of adult Yukon residents said they feel very or somewhat knowledgeable about land claims and self-government. Those who said they feel knowledgeable were more likely to be older, male, non-Whitehorse residents, government employees, long-term Yukon residents, or non-indigenous residents who have an indigenous partner or child (Figure 1).



Question 2 was comprised of a series of ten true-or-false statements. Interviewees were asked to say, based on their understanding of Yukon land claims and self-government, whether they thought the statements were true or false.

Some of the statements proved to be more challenging than others. As there is a 50% chance of getting a true/false question right by flipping a coin, a ratio of correct responses well below 50% suggests a widespread misunderstanding that led numerous people to the wrong answer. Conversely, a ratio of correct responses well above 50% suggests that the information is common knowledge.

Here is how Yukon residents scored on each of the true-or-false questions.

a. All of the Yukon's First Nations have land claim settlements.

Correct answer: False.

Percentage of adult Yukon residents who could answer it correctly: 63%.

b. Non-members of a First Nation always need a permit from a First Nation to walk through their settlement land.

Correct answer: False.

Percentage of adult Yukon residents who could answer it correctly: 56%.

c. Non-members of a First Nation always need a permit from a First Nation to stake a mineral claim on their settlement land.

Correct answer: False.

Percentage of adult Yukon residents who could answer it correctly: 12%.

d. Self-governing First Nations can pass their own laws.

Correct answer: True.

Percentage of adult Yukon residents who could answer it correctly: 60%.

e. Unless specifically replaced by a First Nation law, all territorial and federal laws apply on First Nation settlement land.

Correct answer: True.

Percentage of adult Yukon residents who could answer it correctly: 69%.

f. A citizen of a self-governing First Nation pays the same income taxes as everyone else. Correct answer: True.

Percentage of adult Yukon residents who could answer it correctly: 40%.

g. Self-governing First Nations can manage their own child welfare programs.

Correct answer: True.

Percentage of adult Yukon residents who could answer it correctly: 59%.

h. Self-governing First Nations can establish their own schools.

Correct answer: True.

Percentage of adult Yukon residents who could answer it correctly: 59%.

i. Self-governing First Nations can establish their own justice systems.

Correct answer: True.

Percentage of adult Yukon residents who could answer it correctly: 46%.


j. All Yukoners are able to apply to participate on the boards and committees created through the Final and Self-Government Agreements.

Correct answer: True.

Percentage of adult Yukon residents who could answer it correctly: 42%.

The mean score was 5.23/10, and the median score was 5.

Overall, 32% of adult Yukon residents were able to answer at least seven of the ten questions correctly. Those who are older, live outside Whitehorse, are government employees, are indigenous or have indigenous partners or children, or are long-term Yukon residents were more likely to score 7 or higher (Figure 2). B. People's opinions on land claims and self-government


The next two questions measured people's opinions on land claims and self-government. This was done in two ways:


- 1) By means of a series of statements which respondents were asked to rate on a 5-point scale from 'strongly disagree' to 'strongly agree,' and
- 2) By means of an open-ended question in which respondents were asked for their general thoughts on how land claims and self-government have affected Yukon communities.


In Question 3, respondents were asked to say whether they agreed or disagreed with 7 statements about land claims and self-government:


a.	I'm proud of what the Yukon has accomplished in terms of self-government.	52% agree.
b.	Yukon is a leader in self-government across Canada.	57% agree.
C.	Self-government has the potential to improve the lives of First Nation citizens.	80% agree.
d.	Self-government has the potential to improve the lives of all Yukoners.	67% agree.
e.	Economic development is easier with land claims in place.	49% agree.
f. self	Yukon communities have benefited economically because of land claims and f-government.	50% agree.
g.	Social conditions in Yukon communities have improved because of land claims	
and	d self-government.	41% agree.


Some demographic groups were more likely than others to agree with each of these statements; see Figures 3a – 3g.

















Question 4 was an open-ended question in which respondents were asked to share their general thoughts or comments on how land claims and self-government have affected Yukon communities. Unlike the other survey questions, Question 4 gathered qualitative information, and not everybody responded to the question. Those with strong opinions were more likely to respond to the question than those more neutral views on the topic. Accordingly, the numbers presented in this analysis of Question 4 have not been weighted.

As responses were a mixture of typed comments in a web survey and spoken comments which were paraphrased by the telephone interviewers, they cannot be quoted directly here.

In total, there were 150 open-ended responses which were coded into six thematic categories. These categories were originally generated from the results of the 2011 survey. Ten percent of the comments were off-topic. The remaining responses were distributed as follows:


- Land claims and self-government have had a positive impact (in general): 33% of responses.
- Land claims and self-government are a work in progress: 25% of responses.
- Land claims and self-government have caused division: 16% of responses.
- People need more information to understand land claims and self-government: 9% of responses.
- Land claims and self-government have empowered indigenous people: 3% of responses.
- Land claims and self-government have had a negative impact (in general): 3% of responses.

C. Relevance of land claims and self-government to people's work and personal lives


The next section of the survey asked about the relevance of Yukon land claims and self-government to people's work and personal lives.

First, we asked respondents what type of employer they have, if any. Only those who were currently working were asked the question about relevance of land claims and self-government to their work.

Older respondents and government employees were more likely than others to say that Yukon land claims and self-government are very or somewhat relevant to their work (Figure 4).




Those who identify as indigenous, as well as non-indigenous people who have an indigenous partner or child, were more likely than others to say the Yukon land claims and self-government are very or somewhat relevant to their personal lives (Figure 5).




D. Mapping the Way

The 2021 survey included two new questions which measured the reach and impact of the Mapping the Way public education campaign. Overall, 23% of adult Yukon residents had heard of the campaign. Those who answered yes were more likely to be female, government employees, indigenous, or have lived in the territory for 10 years or longer (Figure 6).



Those who said they have heard of Mapping the Way were asked to what extent the campaign has contributed to their knowledge of Yukon's land claims and self-government agreements. Overall, 33% of those who have heard of the campaign said it has contributed 'a lot' or 'some' to their knowledge. The perceived impact of the campaign was higher for those who are older, live

outside Whitehorse, or have lived in Whitehorse for less than ten years. These estimates should be interpreted with caution as they are based on a subset of respondents.
